SHORELINE ENVIRONMENT DESIGNATION

What is a shoreline environment designation?

Shoreline environment designations work like a zoning overlay. Each designation has standards for development and allowed uses. The purpose of shoreline environment designations is to provide a uniform basis for applying policies and regulations within similar environmental conditions.

There are six environment designations for shorelines in Gig Harbor: **Natural**, **Urban Conservancy**, **Low Intensity**, **City Waterfront**, **Historic Working Waterfront**, and **Marine Deepwater**.

What is the purpose of the Urban Conservancy designation?

The purpose of the Urban Conservancy environment is to protect and restore ecological functions of open space, flood-plain and other sensitive lands where they exist in urban and developed settings, while allowing a variety of compatible uses.

What is the required buffer in the Urban Conservancy designation?

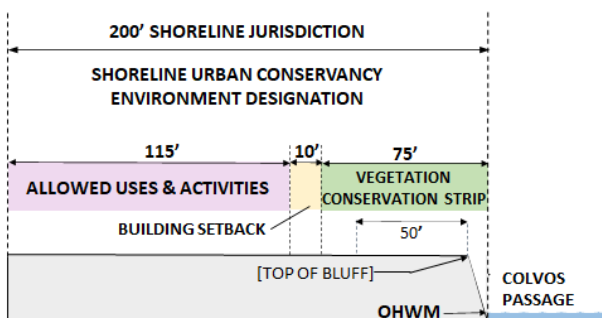
The vegetation conservation strip buffer to protect “nearshore” habitat and water quality varies depending on the location of your shoreline property:

- **Colvos Passage:** a 50-foot wide buffer from the top of the bluff or 75-foot buffer from the “ordinary high water mark” (OHWM), whichever is greater
- **All other areas:** a 100-foot wide buffer from the OHWM

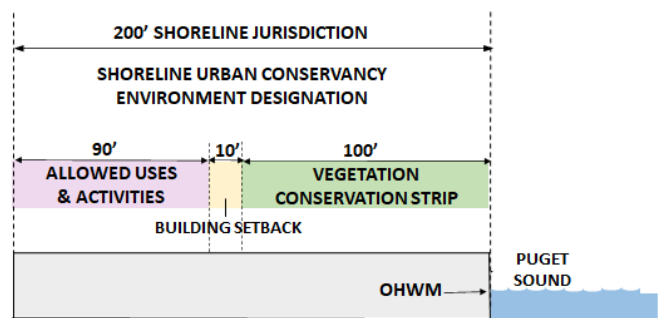
In some cases, a larger buffer to protect a critical area might be required. A 10-foot building setback from the buffer is required to limit construction impacts.

Buffers should consist of an undisturbed area of native vegetation. No buildings or structures are allowed in the buffer unless specifically permitted by the SMP. Development activities allowed in the buffer are limited to uses such as unpaved trails and habitat enhancement projects. If development exists, revegetation or enhancement may be required when the

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Allowed Uses and Activities

Aquaculture permitted for Donkey Creek for a fish hatchery facility only

Boat Launch Facilities (private)

- hand launch only
- concrete ramps prohibited

Boat Launch facilities (public)

- hand launch only
- ramps made of rails or graded slope
- concrete and planks prohibited

Clearing and Grading only in association with an approved shoreline development

Commercial Uses

- water-oriented and non-water oriented uses landward of OHWM
- water-dependent uses waterward of OHWM
- **deck structures appurtenant to permitted upland water-related and water-enjoyment uses in limited situations.**

Commercial Fishing Moorage

Dredging and Dredge Material Disposal for shoreline restoration purposes and stream culvert maintenance only

Educational Facilities (scientific, historical, cultural, educational research uses)

Uses Allowed Only With a Conditional Use Permit

Aquaculture

- bottom culture: on-bed and on-cultch - Purdy, McCormick and Goodnough Creeks only
- bag, rack & bag, stake, and long-line - Purdy and Goodnough Creeks only
- hydraulic harvest methods - Purdy and Goodnough Creeks only
